




Event Medical/First Aid Resourcing Analysis/Assessment

The following are a list of factors to consider when assessing your event medical/first aid resourcing needs assessment:

- Risk analysis & historical incident data
- Concert crowd capacity / expected attendance
- Duration of the event
- Weather
- Concert music genre
- Demographics of attendees
- Alcohol & drugs
- Number of event staff with first aid qualifications & training
- Onsite private security/police training & equipment
- Local EMS (911) response time
- Distance to nearest hospital/ER
- Local regulations / guidelines for minimum medical resources at 'special events':
 - AED (>500)
 - First aid station with EMT
 - Advance life support (ALS) ambulance

Medical Incident/ Emergency Response Checklist


The following is an example of a step-by-step checklist for training and briefing event staff and volunteers in the event of a medical incident.

- 1. Assess the situation (observe and orientate)
- 2. Ensure it's safe for you to approach the injured patient; if assisting the patient/s, exposes you to unsafe hazards, do not proceed
- 3. Seek immediate assistance call 911 / contact your event staff / ops lead via radio
- 4. Administer first aid, if trained to do so
- 5. Reassure the patient that help is on the way
- 6. Stay with the patient, provide necessary assistance until arrival of EMS/medical professionals

Other supporting tasks:

- Event Manager assigns staff/volunteer to meet incoming EMS and direct to them to the incident location / patient
- Maintain a privacy 'cordon' around the patient; move bystanders away







Stop the Bleed

The purpose of 'stop the bleed' training is to equip individuals/event staff with the knowledge and skills to control life-threatening bleeding in emergency situations before the arrival/response of first responders (Fire & EMS).





Reflections: Event Risk Management

- What could happen (go wrong)?
- 2) What would cause it to happen?
- 3) How **likely** is it to occur?
- 4) What are the potential consequences/impact?
- 5) How can we **reduce the likelihood** of the **risk** & if it occurs, how can we **reduce the severity** of impact/harm (consequences)?

What is risk management?...the identification, assessment, and prioritization of risks, followed by the coordinated and economical application of resources, to minimize, monitor, and control the probability and/or impact of unfortunate events.






Safe & Inclusive Concert Series Events

Summary of Key Discussion Points from the 2 Break Rooms

The following points are the key points discussed pertaining to enhancing safety and security at FOL and AMP grantee concert series in 2024:

- Pre-concert team briefings
- Use of radios to enhance communications; requirement for noise-cancelling radio 'ear buds'
- Clear C3 chain of command
- Documenting incident reports
- Volunteer training safety and security awareness, protocols and procedures
- Understanding the 'risk profile' headliners and artists
- Advice from police during special event permit process





Tips for enhancing safe & inclusive event environments

- Build and foster close relationships with local law enforcement, fire & EMS, public safety and emergency management agencies
- Build relationships with stakeholders around your venue site whole of community approach
- Utilize the power of hello to support a safer, more welcoming and inclusive environment
- 'Soften' the traditional black look of security uniforms
- Team briefs and communication / escalation protocols
- Situational crime prevention techniques (next section)



Situational Crime Prevention (SCP)

- SCP evidenced based environmental criminology approach, adopted within 'problemoriented policing' strategies.
- An approach designed to adversely influence a threat actors / criminals decision making and risk calculus through reducing environmental opportunities to commit crime or terrorism.
- 5 pillars and 25 tactics/ protocols which also contribute to safer events:
 - 1) Increase the **Effort**
 - 2) Increase the **Risk**
 - 3) Reduce the **Rewards**
 - 4) Reduce **Provocations**
 - 5) Remove Excuses



Target Hardening – perimeter fencing, access control points, vehicle security barriers [partially applicable]

- Control Access to the Venue position event staff at ingress points
- Screen Entry and Exits guests & staff [not directly applicable]
- Deflect Offenders random law enforcement patrols, visible security, street closures, parking restrictions,
- Control Tools & Weapons terms and conditions of entry, security screening, 'subject to search' policy

1. Increase the Effort





2. Increase the Risks

- Extend Guardianship whole of community effort, engage with your neighbors and surrounding business
- Reduce Anonymity 'the power of hello', credentials, access control
- Utilize Place Managers assign responsible space owners (event staff)
- Enhance Natural Surveillance design, people, lighting, sight lines
- Utilize security technologies video surveillance, intrusion detection systems [more applicable to FOL venues as opposed to AMP grantees]





3. Reduce the Rewards

- Conceal Targets from view high value /attractive items
- Remove Targets secure high value / attractive items, if not directly supervised or observed
- Identify Property- mark organizational high value items with distinctive, nonremovable marking
- Disrupt Markets response to ambush/guerilla marketing, policing strategies to disrupt movement/sale of stolen items [not directly applicable]
- Deny Benefits enforcement of policies (criminal trespass) removal of graffiti



4. Reduce Provocations

- Reduce Frustrations and Stress –efficient queues managed by event staff (e.g food and beverage), provide timely and accurate information to attendees
- Avoid Disputes utilize escalation protocols (trained event staff) and verbal judo training,
- Reduce Emotional Arousal fan separation, designated family zones
- Neutralize Peer Pressure alcohol and behavior, proactively engage with attendees
- Discourage Imitation (copycats) timely removal of graffiti, repair of vandalism





5. Reduce Excuses

- Set Rules policies, terms and conditions for entry, attendee code of conduct
- Post Instructions social media, website, venue signage and pre-concert announcements for prohibited items and 'code of conduct'
- Alert Conscience share values and culture (Levitt Foundation)
- Assist Compliance through active event staff engagement with attendees
- Control Alcohol & Drugs responsible service of alcohol (staff training & certification), active monitoring during the concert






Key Take-aways
